Working for Greater Boston Legal Services' Latinas Know Your Rights Project was an incredible learning experience and an invaluable opportunity to serve a community with multiple barriers to accessing legal services. The Project handles family law, immigration and public benefits matters for low-income domestic violence survivors in furtherance of its mission to provide holistic services to its target population.

As an Equal Justice America fellow, I contributed to the ongoing work of the Project and consequently, positively impacted the quality of life for six domestic violence survivors living in the Boston area. I prepared U visa and Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) self-petition applications, helping our clients to access the immigration benefits created by Congress for victims of violence. I conducted in-depth interviews with clients, collected supporting documents, drafted client story affidavits, and completed immigration forms.

Due to the unique multi-service nature of the Latinas Know Your Rights Project, I was able to assist one client, K, on many different issues simultaneously. I began working on K's case while my supervisor was representing her in a child custody matter against her abusive exboyfriend. While my supervisor handled the pressing family law matter, I began preparing her U visa application, conducting multiple interviews with her about the psychological and physical abuse she has endured and continues to endure. To fulfill a requirement of the U visa application, I advocated with a local law enforcement agency to request that the agency certify K's helpfulness in the investigation of a crime. I collected supporting documents from her friends, doctor and therapist to build a strong case for her application. At the same time, I helped her open a food stamp and cash benefit case for her daughter after she lost her job. K's U visa case is ongoing, but I am hopeful that the project will be submitting a thorough application for this client.

I gained tremendous perspective from working with the Latinas Know Your Rights clients. I feel confident that my work for the Project assisted clients, like K, who might not otherwise have access to legal services due to financial, language, and cultural barriers. I hope my work helped not only to achieve concrete legal ends, but also to empower my clients. My internship, enabled by the Equal Justice America fellowship, solidified my already-established commitment to working with low-income populations. Thank you!
