## Re: Evaluation for Leslie A. Ruiz

It is my pleasure to write to describe Leslie Ruiz's work in my program area at Legal Aid at Work during her EJA-funded clerkship this past summer. As EJA well knows, Leslie is a committed social justice advocate whose work and life experiences have well equipped her to use her legal skills in service of underrepresented communities, particularly in conjunction with projects falling within LAAW's National Origin and Immigrants' Rights program, which I direct.

Leslie's litigation projects over the summer included undertaking complex legal research in support of a motion to oppose intrusive discovery into the personnel files of an Afghan client who was subjected to a hostile work environment, and identifying the state law remedies available to our client in a Title VII national origin discrimination case. As well, Leslie was very involved in LAAW's provision of direct legal services, including responding to potential claims of language discrimination through our Language Rights Helpline, staffing LAAW's Workers' Rights and Wage Claims clinics, and taking the lead in representing a wage claimant in a settlement conference before the California Labor Commissioner. Unsurprisingly—because of her legal skills, diligence, and hard work—Leslie excelled in all of these projects.

In particular, I would note that Leslie has been a delightful colleague to us. In contrast to many of her peers, Leslie was deeply invested in the cases and projects she was assigned to, taking ownership and initiative without having to be encouraged to do so. I have also been struck by how focused Leslie has been with respect to getting the very most out of her clinical experiences, including her clear desire to learn as much as possible about real-world lawyering and her offering to continue working with us on an unfunded basis during the school year to engage in further skill-building. These qualities make me very confident in saying that EJA's
