As I start my first day of 2L, I would like to reflect on my exciting and challenging summer at the Civil Rights Litigation Initiative. When I started in May, I remember feeling excited but nervous for the journey ahead. Although I had completed my first year of law school, I cannot say I felt prepared to handle cases as a student attorney. However, as the summer progressed, I began to feel more and more comfortable.

First, I worked on a variety of research assignments spanning from constitutional to administrative law in a lawsuit against the Trump administration. Although I was faced with many unfamiliar legal issues, my team and I were able to answer complex legal questions after various discussions and research. Second, I worked on a civil rights case that is in ongoing discovery. This case has been extremely rewarding and challenging as the entire summer was filled with important discovery deadlines. Third, I worked on an ongoing project that empowers Washtenaw County residents to amend their racially restrictive covenant.
