Week of June 14:

This summer, I am working as an intern for the Mississippi Center for Justice (MCJ). For the last three weeks, I have worked with the Health and Consumer Protection teams on a few different projects. A lot of my time has been spent doing research and collecting data. I recently finished compiling data on the uninsured population in Mississippi. Information about that population continually changes and it's helpful for the Health team to know the current data, as they continue to work to ensure that low-income Mississippians have access to high quality, affordable healthcare.
